
What to pack

- Glasses / contact lens (if applicable)
- Medications (if applicable)
- Photos of your family and friends
- Travel-sized toiletries (you can purchase full-sized items in Australia)

- Prescriptions / letter from your doctor for any medication you are carrying
- Translated driver's licence from your home country. You can find a translator here.
- Travel insurance documents (we recommend purchasing insurance before travel)

Queensland Climate

Academic Integrity
