



WELCOME TO ONLINE STUDY

If you are reading this, you are either about to begin or are considering beginning your studies in one of our new online diploma programs – the Diploma of Educational Studies or the Diploma of Social and Psychological Science.

These programs have been designed with the same academic quality outcomes, as our on-campus diplomas, but with the added flexibility to learn from anywhere in Australia.

Studying online with Griffith College means you can balance your education with work, family, and personal commitments.

You are in control of your schedule, while still attending scheduled live online workshops that connect you to your lecturers and peers.

You will have access to expert teaching staff, dedicated support services, and a connected online community that ensures that even if studying a far, you're never studying in isolation!

Your online diploma is also your direct pathway into a related Griffith University bachelor degree.

Upon successful completion, you can transition seamlessly into university study - At university there is flexibility for some or all of your courses to be accessed online or mixed mode, it will depend on your chosen bachelor progression.

This guide will take you through what to expect from online study, how your courses are delivered, how assessments work, key timelines, the support available to you, and an overview of each diploma.

Think of it as your reference point - a document you can revisit throughout your studies whenever you need clarity on what to do next or where to find help.

Studying online is different from on-campus learning in both pace and style.

It offers the flexibility to choose when and where you study, but it also requires self-discipline and strong time management skills.

CLASS PREPARATION

Each week, you will access your course materials in Moodle, Griffith College's online learning platform. You are expected to review the weekly content before attending your live online workshop.

This includes watching mini-lectures (typically 30 to 40 minutes each), completing assigned readings, working through interactive activities, and attempting any ungraded quizzes provided. The aim is to arrive at your workshop ready to discuss the material, ask questions, and engage in the learning activities set by your lecturer.

WEEKLY WORKLOAD COMMITMENT

You should plan to spend approximately

10 hours per course per week, including workshop time. This is a realistic estimate based on student feedback and the volume of readings, activities, and assessments required to stay on track.

Three or four courses a trimester is considered full-time (30 or 40 hours per week), while part-time can be one or two courses at a time.

You may adjust your load from trimester to trimester depending on your circumstances, but remember that your study load impacts how quickly you will complete your diploma, your study plan, and your transition to Griffith University.

COURSE **DELIVERY**

All online courses are delivered through Moodle, where you will find your readings, lecture videos, activities, discussion boards, and assessment information. Your learning is a combination of independent study and scheduled live workshops.

The three - part weekly learning model:

01. Prepare -

Before your workshop, you will complete your pre-class activities. This may involve watching recorded minilectures, reading assigned chapters or journal articles, and completing short quizzes or practice tasks. This preparation gives you the background knowledge you need to fully participate in your workshop.

02. Participate —

Each course includes a weekly live workshop of one to two hours, conducted via a video conferencing platform (a camera and microphone capabilities are mandatory). Your workshop timetable will remain consistent for the entire trimester, so you will know your schedule from the moment you enrol. These sessions are highly interactive and designed to reinforce your understanding of the week's content. You can ask questions, work in breakout groups, and engage in discussion with both your lecturer and peers.

03. Consolidate

After the workshop, you are encouraged to revisit the lecture content, re-do activities, and review your notes. Moodle allows you to track your progress through each module, making it easy to see what you have completed and what is still outstanding.







UNDERSTANDING ASSESSMENTS AND EXAMS

Assessment in the online mode is continuous and varied.

Most courses have three assessment tasks, although the exact format will differ depending on the subject. Examples include:

- · Online quizzes or tests
- Research essays or reports
- Oral presentations conducted via Zoom or Teams
- · Case study analysis
- Exams with a mix of multiple-choice and short-answer questions

Assignments are submitted through Turnitin in Moodle, where they are also checked for academic integrity. Due dates for online students are the same as for on-campus students, and these will be listed in your course outline from week one.

Some courses include a final exam, which will also be completed online. You will need a functional laptop with a working camera and microphone, along with a reliable internet connection. The exam period occurs in the final week of the trimester and exact times will be provided well in advance.

UNDERSTANDING YOUR TRIMESTER STRUCTURE

Each trimester at Griffith College runs for 12 weeks of classes followed by one week of exams. Academic calendars for current and upcoming trimesters can be found on the Griffith College website to help you stay on top of key dates. Trimester planners are also provided to help you organise your studies and better visualise when assessments are due and exams are held. Other key milestones for your first trimester are listed below.

ORIENTATION

Held the week before classes begin, your virtual orientation covers how to use Moodle, Turnitin, and other systems, as well as an introduction to support services and study skills resources. Attendance is strongly encouraged.

COURSE ENROLMENT

Once your program admission is complete and you have applied for FEE-HELP or paid fees, you will be ready to enrol.

Enrolment usually opens about 4 weeks prior to the start of trimester. This is where you select the courses you will study in your first trimester, and where you opt for your part-time study load is applicable. At this stage your workshop times will be confirmed.

Last day to change your enrolment yourself in the student portal

Census Date (End of Week 4)

Final day to withdraw from a course without financial penalty

Academic Withdrawal Date (End of Week 8)

Final day to withdraw without academic penalty

You may switch from online to on-campus study (or vice versa) between trimesters, but not during a trimester.

Studying online does not mean studying alone. You will have access to the same support as on-campus students:

Industry demand and outlook

The Australian Government projects strong growth in psychology, counselling, and community services over the next decade, driven by increasing demand for mental health support, aged care services, and social policy development.

Indicative salaries (post-bachelor degree):

Registered psychologist: \$85,000-\$130,000+ per year

Counsellor: \$70,000-\$100,000+ per year Social worker: \$75,000-\$110,000+ per year

Policy or research officer: \$80,000-\$120,000+ per year
